

Tim Tiley

Adventures of a Very Original Travelling Salesman...!

2021, as well as being a very strange and difficult year for many, I realised just how strange when Paul called and asked Margaret if I could be your guest speaker in Shrewsbury!

We have all come into this world of Ecclesiastical Tourism from very different backgrounds. It is a fascinating world which involves our heritage, our interactions with tourists, all muddled up with a sprinkling of faith. My thanks to my wife, Margaret who has written most of this speech for me to help to explain how I have come to be here.

I was born in Birmingham, where my father, who to confuse you was also known as Tim Tiley, was Vicar of St Paul's Church in Smethwick, so I am still not sure if I qualify as a "Black Country" man or a "Brummy" – perhaps someone can finally give me a definitive answer?

Being a Vicar's family, we moved around quite alot from Smethwick to Worcestershire, Warwickshire and Gloucestershire. I remember in the 1960s when we were living in a small Warwickshire hamlet called Idlicote, the church had just had a new Compton Electronic organ installed. This was too much temptation for a thirteen year old to resist. Forget Bach, thinking there was nobody else around I discovered how you could really make the House of the Rising Sun gave the woodworm something to remember, then I heard the creaking of the North door being opened.

In 2000 Margaret and I returned to that church, as Claire our eldest daughter, chose to get married there and when we went in to the vestry to sign the register it was quite a surprise to see my Father's name on the same page in the register!

My Mother Mystica, was born in Ceylon and lived there for the first 10 years of her life, then sent back with her brother to England to be educated. My paternal Grandfather George Tiley was The Steward (Domestic Bursar) working in prisons, and spent time at many of Her Majesty's institutions including Manchester Strangeways and Bristol Horfield. He died 3 weeks before his 107th birthday. As small boys my brother and I used to ask him if he ever took part in any hangings. He would usually reply with a straight face but a bit of a twinkle that he always had to "order the rope". We found this to be most stimulating....

On a happier note there have been many clergy in my family, my Father, his Brother, a great Grandfather and my great, great Grandfather who was a Canon of St Patricks Cathedral in Dublin. In 1917 my Great Grandmother Isobel, while still married to the Reverend Herbert Seddon Vicar of Painswick converted to become a Roman Catholic. That must have led to some interesting conversations...

As a young teenager I was very interested in steam trains, and would spend hours train spotting. At 50 I received a Hornby Flying Scotsman railway set and more and more trains, and building etc were added. As the grandchildren appeared we added Thomas and Friends to the collection and the layout took over one room in our home which became known as The Train Room.

Back to my misspent youth; After we left smoky Smethwick I was educated in Malvern, Worcestershire. To fill my gap year I ripped tickets and scrubbed floors at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre at Stratford and then in 1967 I and a school friend managed to get a free passage to cross the Atlantic on a grain ship heading for Montreal where we earned a little money working at a rather dubious hotel during the Expo 67 World Fair in Montreal and then hitch hiked through Ontario and Winnipeg to Calgary.

I foolishly, like many students at the time was conned into trying to sell Encyclopaedias door to door for a week when I made my one and only sale! I gave up trying to sell Encyclopaedias and went on to pick cherries in The Okanagan area before eventually crossing the Rockies to Vancouver.



My Mother Mystica had two brothers and one younger sister. Her sister Paxye was a bit wild, she was a photographer and settled in Bombay and had a pet leopard called Kiki....sadly some neighbours fearing for the safety of their children eventually poisoned her....Kiki I mean!

This was 1967 – known as the Summer of Love and the Summer of race riots. I came across both . I hitchhiked to San Francisco and had several lifts with hippies who usually wanted to offer me a "cap" , not headgear but a little container of the then popular hallucinatory drug. Fortunately for me, I had recently taken up Transcendental Meditation before leaving England so I thanked my hippy friends, but said I didn't need a cap because I meditated and as they already had heard about the Maharishi and The Beatles they thought this was "Far Out" and we got on surprisingly well for the rest of the journey.

I arrived back in England ready to study Engineering Science at St Peters College Oxford, History would have been my choice but did not want to disappoint my parents. My summer vacation job was driving groups of mature ladies up and down the River Avon at Stratford. So I was already learning about tourism as well as engineering when the petrol motor often gave up the ghost

When I graduated I had started a business distributing brass rubbings and later Calligraphy posters and cards from the attic of my father's rectory, This was at Sapperton near Cirencester. In 1990 Margaret and I were married in that church. Being a bachelor at 4I, I not only married but took on 3 daughters. What sane man would take on 4 women at once! I am delighted to say I have never looked back and with great pride we now have 7 grandchildren, Ben being the oldest at twenty down to Max aged eleven.

In the mid 70s my second venture into the Church and Tourism industry was starting brass rubbing centres with some partners, in Bristol, Bath, London, Oxford, Stratford upon Avon, Glastonbury, Edinburgh and Washington DC. To promote them I even on occasions walked the streets wearing fake chain mail. This venture lasted for about four profitable years, before like pop groups we all quarrelled and broke up. My hair was rather longer in those days, and I wore Cuban heals and flared trousers, some of you may remember them. The grandchildren on seeing a photo wanted to know who the strange woman was.

In the early 70s, before the brass rubbing took off, I was also making cards and travelling on my moped in to Cirencester where I would park it and then hitchhike on around the country. It was a shock to some of my customers when they realised how I had arrived. In those days a few Cathedrals and Churches just had cards and publications on trestle tables down the sides of their naves rather than shops. In 1973 I attended my first equivalent of a CCSA meeting, at "All Hallows Beside the Tower" church in London then the annual meeting later was moved to Chester and then on to different Churches and Cathedrals all around the UK as now.

Over many years it has been a great pleasure to supply our cards to so many and varied churches, I remember Sid Harrison from Jarrow travelling to Australia via Hong Kong and found our cards for sale. The most Southerly church that our cards reached was ChristChurch Cathedral in the South Island of New Zealand . Sadly this cathedral was destroyed in that terrible earthquake.


My mother and father hoped that I would get a proper job one day. She, as a hobby, traced her ancestry back to some Saxon theign and travelled the country for her research. Maybe her enthusiasm for our Cathedral and Church buildings is something that I have inherited from her.

I would like to finish my story involving the early days of the CCSA by thanking all of our Cathedral and Church Shop Managers for continuing to support us, as I also hope that we in our turn will support you all.

Humility... a Visit in Shrewsbury

After the Trade Fair closed on Thursday afternoon the 16th September, I took a wander around Shrewsbury. Approaching St Alkmund's church I was drawn by the most beautiful music emanating from the west door and wondered if I'd chanced upon a concert.

So I pulled apart the thin, hanging chains at the entrance and entered, only to find the church completely empty. Where was the music was coming from? Eventually I turned sharp left to spot, hidden behind a black piano and playing with immense tenderness, a ragged, weathered tramp, barefoot and with a beard almost down to his waist. He didn't look up.

Moved, I crept down the aisle and listened for half an hour or so from a front pew. The music, none of which I recognised, soared and I was filled with an intense spirituality. Before me and the huge Assumption window burned a single candle in a candelabra. As I like to do, I lit 3 candles for passed family members, taking a light from the solitary candle. Then I lit a fourth, for the tramp.

He continued to play as I tiptoed back down the aisle and he still never looked up. On the steps outside the church a couple appeared, also drawn by the music and as they loudly greeted me and asked if there was a concert I put my fingers to my lips and said: 'come, come and see who's playing'. Astonished, the husband drew the pianist into conversation. In a well-spoken voice he told us he'd only just been allowed back into the church to play and had missed it dreadfully. He didn't say what had prevented him - Covid perhaps? I asked him where he learnt to play. 'I'm still learning' was his response, 'it's all in my head, swimming around'. I then realised that the pieces must have been his own compositions. As I left, I mentioned I'd lit four candles and one was for him. 'I lit one when I came in' he said 'for everybody, so that covers us all'.

Selling during a pandemic... I don't think so. Haven't we come a long way since the beginning of the pandemic? Nearly two years of opening and closing, not only for Saint Patrick's Cathedral, but for the world. We seem to have reached the stage of restrictions continually lifting and, as we look towards the future, we all hope and pray that society returns to near normality soon. Tourist numbers will take a little while longer to return to 2019 figures, however, we must remain hopeful and determined to push ahead and to think positively.

We at Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin have been under considerable financial pressure as we began our 'Roof Project' just before the pandemic started, which was featured in the CCSA Talking Shop Spring 2020 Edition. The Nave roof was in urgent need of repair so it commenced, little knowing that the works would be halted, until, deemed essential work by the government, it proceeded full steam ahead.

It is now finished and is looking superb; we have just the small matter of paying for it...We have been very lucky with a financial grant from the government, people donating to the cause and the Dean's work in raising awareness of the project in order to acquire financial help.

Needless to say, the raising of Purchase Orders did not happen and our shop was closed for many months owing to that dreaded word; 'lockdown'. Now, fully open and raising purchase orders, there is light at the end of the tunnel. Visitor numbers are beginning to increase and we hope that by I7th March, St. Patrick's Day, we have a steady flow of tourists through the doors.

The shop, as in most churches and cathedrals, is one of the main sources of revenue so great emphasis has been placed this year on its success. To this end, we are in the process of developing bespoke products, which, we hope, are going to be the start of the creation of the 'Saint Patrick's Cathedral' brand.

This is the focus of the retail department, working in tandem with the marketing department, for 2022. We have concentrated on particular pieces of stained glass and monuments synonymous to the cathedral with which to develop a range of products. My creative flair doesn't have much scope unfortunately, so with the marketing department, and along with the Dean's suggestions, we hope to build a product range that appeals to all of our visitors.


With this in mind, I must praise the CCSA, all the Suppliers that we have met during the Annual Conferences and, of course, all Members with whom we have networked. The networking that is enjoyed by all is priceless and so very important to the future of Churches and Cathedral shops.



I can't emphasise that strongly enough - the shop is brought into the serious mission of the church by the embracing of that vision by clergy and laity. The church gift shop is a part of the church, and without it being open there was an empty space. An important and useful 'member' of the church's 'body' was missing. The warm, bright and cheerful atmosphere it creates was missing; the talents and training of some of its volunteers were missing; smiles and laughter and simple pleasures were often missing; and, crucially, some of the pastoral work that might normally have been done remained undone. What a joy when it could re-open (after a lot of cleaning and polishing) and welcome people again! Certainly the rules meant that things couldn't be exactly as they had been but the lights were on, the staff were back and the buzz it created was wonderful - and continues to be, despite the setbacks. There is a wholeness and completeness about the building that, just seems right. What does this have to do with St Paul? Well, you can probably guess what is coming: I Corinthians 12. 12-31a. Read it through if you wish, it is an excellent and relevant part of St Paul's letter. Said simply, if a part of the body is missing, no matter how less honourable it is seen than others, the body ceases to function properly. Our gift shop is part of the body that is St Mary and All Saints Parish Church. That's how we see it; and, by being there, it helps the rest to work more smoothly. 
My background has been in the Museums and Heritage sector for the past 16 years, so the Cathedral is a new challenge which I'm very much enjoying.




